Chief Executive

This report will attempt to satisfy both requirements and hopefully pays tribute to the people who have made the achievements possible with their hard work and endless enthusiasm.

76 children placed - the highest number in my tenure at Adoption Matters and indeed the highest number of children placed since 1967, itself a significant year in adoption history. Three words - 76 children placed -cannot fully describe the hard work of all the dedicated staff or panel that played their part in each piece of the jigsaw, or the journey taken by the prospective adopters in fitting the jigsaw together.

Significantly **49%** of the children placed were part of a sibling group and **74%** were placed on behalf of Local Authorities with whom we work, in partnership as part of the Regional Adoption Agencies.

Our continuing and developing partnership with Caritas Care in the areas of Concurrency, Adoption Support and Bespoke Family Finding continues to grow. Over 50 children have now been placed as part of the Concurrency Service and over 300 families this year have been offered adoption support as well as over 100 schools. Everyone involved in concurrency has to deal with greater risk and uncertainty and no one should ever underestimate the pressures involved in caring for adopted children.

I always like to acknowledge the contribution of all our supporters, volunteers, Board of Trustees and staff without whose efforts, our achievements would not be possible. I would particularly like to pay tribute to Gwen Laird who retired during this year for her enthusiasm and tireless work with Blackburn Diocesan Adoption Agency and for the last 10 years with Adoption Matters.

I would also like to pay tribute to Revd. Stanley "Stan" Winton whose sage and encouraging words were always appreciated by prospective adopters as well as the Chief Executive. Stan you will be sadly missed and our condolences go to all your family.

Next year will no doubt require even greater effort by the team as we embark on some new opportunities as well as anticipating some challenging changes in personnel, but with your help and support we can continue to make adoption matter over the next 70 years.

This last year for Adoption Matters is rightly regarded as a success story - not entirely and not completely but nevertheless a very good year. Against the odds, Adoption Matters has maintained its momentum in building high quality services upon enduring values and integrity, demonstrating consistently professional skills and commitment. More children and families than ever before have been brought together, encouraged and equipped to sustain lasting relationships that bring safety, hope, love, peace and joy... None of this will be possible without the people who make up the Adoption Matters family and partnerships. We are indebted to them all for their commitment of thinking, ideas, time and energy. Norman Goodwin has once again played a key role in securing the achievements that are celebrated in this report. Special thanks also go to Alan Rowntree who retired this year. Alan played a vital role as a trustee and treasurer of the Blackburn Diocesan Adoption Agency from the late 1970s. He was a key architect of the merger that produced Adoption Matters North West and the lead trustee for finance with Adoption Matters. Alan has contributed enormously to the development of the agency with his professional skills, calmness and wisdom.

Business Plan & Strategy 2017-19

This year sees the beginning of a new strategic planning cycle for the agency. Over recent years the adoption sector has faced an increasingly fastpaced and changing environment in terms of policy, procedures, external requirements and not least the social and political landscape. 

Home for Good Partnership goes from strength to strength

Home for Good is a charity that exists to put fostering and adoption on the agenda of the Church. They raise awareness, encourage people to consider fostering and adoption, and inspire and equip churches to better support families that foster and adopt.

Our partnership with Home for Good has enabled the agency's profile to be established in a wider network of churches and national events, such as Adoption Sunday, which involved 350 churches simultaneously running events. Home for Good's mission blends well with our own aims to find families for specific hard to place children.

Swimming school gets attachment friendly

The Centre for Adoption Support teamed up with national swimming school Puddle Ducks to help train all their teachers the importance of attachment for children who have been in care.

Puddle Ducks currently teach over 18,000 babies, toddlers, pre-school and primary school children across the UK every week and wanted to ensure their teachers are trained to care for children from all backgrounds.

Puddle Ducks' Technical Director Ali Beckman commented:

"We worked closely with the Centre's specialist adoption staff to develop a training module for our staff on the importance of attachment for children who have been in care. This will apply to children who are now in adoptive or fostering placements. The module is now a mandatory part of teacher training and we are proud that all 300 of our swimming teachers have now completed the module".
